Fran Ludden gives her impressions of Cambodia, eight years after her last visit.......

The first thing to hit you after the 30 hour journey from England is the early evening heat and the red dusty atmosphere as the sun sets over Phnom Penh. Once you leave the airport you begin to remember the pace of life in the capital, the noises and the smells, and later, the taste of the first of many Khmer rice and noodle dishes. Life in the city is very busy.



It's eight years since I visited Cambodia and I was eager to see what had changed. I have now been back home for nearly 2 months and my head is still spinning with images of the places we visited and people we met and I am only now beginning to be able to put my thoughts into words.

Many things haven't changed. Although the names and faces may be new, once again, more than anything else, I was overwhelmed by the energy and commitment of so many people in loving and serving the poor. It is truly humbling, challenging and inspirational.

There is more money in Cambodia today, the infra-structure is improving, the use of technology for communication and in education is now widespread and all these things herald progress in so many ways. Foreign aid is making a difference, but so is foreign investment, and not always in a positive way. These developments, plus the growth of tourism and trade, have improved much of city life but for the poorest of the poor, particularly in rural areas, daily life is still a struggle. The provision of clean water, housing, nutritious food, medical support, access to decent education and basic necessities such as toiletries is still patchy and often dependent on being "on the radar" of an NGO [non-governmental organisation]. This is where "small money, big difference" charities such as SVPPORT <AMBODIA really come into their own.

It was an exhausting three weeks, full of highs as well as lows. My overwhelming impression is that the work of **SUPPORT CAMBODIA** changes lives. It may only be a small charity but time after time, I witnessed first-hand how careful planning between those on the ground in Cambodia and those who work for and support the charity back home really does improve the lives of people who otherwise might go unnoticed or forgotten. Every penny is well spent and every penny counts.

NEWS ROUND-UP

While in Battambang we caught up with Ismael Lim, former Head Teacher at Phnom Priel where we sunk our first two borewells in 2016. [NB: all 8 borewells are working and in use]. We hope to visit his new school next year.....The 'Soups, Slides & Crafts' event on 16th March was sold out and raised an astonishing £807.10 to fund the Rohal Hand Wash Project [see PAGE 5]. Big thanks to all who came or helped make it a real success......The Community Hall at Pheasabao Village, paid for by the 2018 'Soups' event and one of the many initiatives of the amazing **Sister Vangie**, is being very well used [picture PAGE 1].....28 Family and 2 **Community Water Filters** were presented during our trip. Thanks to the **Safe Water Trust** for their continued support and to a private donor for the big filter at **Pursat Kindergarten** where we were delighted to renew acquaintances with **Sister Franny** [picture PAGE 1] and meet some of the 800+ young people she and her Sisters help every week.

17 days, 31 locations, over 1600 miles [mainly on dirt roads] distributing everything from vitamins and clothes to toiletries, stationery and money for underwear, furniture and playground equipment, far too much to detail here but it's all in the TOUR DIARY [see PAGE 5]...it's a good read!!!

An inspiring appreciation by FATHER MARK LOPEZ of his 'Fearless-Girl' volunteers

Elaine, mid-twenties, is a licensed nurse from Singapore. She used to work for one of the big hospitals back home, but now she runs the health care program of the Catholic Church in Kampong Thom through which we try to look after the needs of the elderly and chronically-ill in our very poor



communities. (To be poor, elderly and chronically-ill, is often to be lonely, forgotten and neglected here in Cambodia).

Everyday, with Singaporean reliability, consistency and promptness, she gets on her old motorcycle and drives off to our mission stations to attend to her patients. Some patients are 15-20 km of rough dirt road away. Some have advanced Parkinson's, some have failing vision, some are paraplegic or quadriplegic. Many have complications arising from hypertension or diabetes. Elaine attends to them and is also able to quickly identify who of the sick must be brought to the hospital to see a doctor. (Often,

she will help to bring them to the hospital herself, and will help them navigate through the sometimes complicated health-care system for the poor here).

Her partner in this sometimes death-defying enterprise of going off into our farther flung villages (they have fallen off their motorcycle more than once) is Priscilla, our other Fearless Girl-volunteer from the Philippines.

Priscilla runs the children's libraries in three of our mission stations here. She also occasionally brings a sack full of books to places where there are no libraries or no schools, conducting "mobile library" operations, under the shade of a tree or wherever children like to gather. Prior to working in Kampong Thom, I had never seen or heard of kids who cheerfully demand for a library to be opened or who insist on their English lessons, but that is the case when children see that Priscilla is around.

She has magically imparted a love for books, a love for learning, and most recently, a love for Lego.

And the fearless catch - she has done this over the past 2 years with no Khmer language skills whatsoever. But the children love her, because she knows how to patiently sit and watch, teach and play, mother and love them in her uniquely gifted way. Oh and by the way, Priscilla happens to be in her early sixties. (Yes, friends, because even in the volunteer world, 60 is the new 20.)

Here's to all you fearless girls whose rights should not only be protected and promoted on this day, but whose giftedness - to our missions, to our families, to our workplaces, to leadership, to our governments, to our pulpits and altars, to our liturgies, to our faith communities, and to the world - should ceaselessly be celebrated and set on top of a hill, for your beautiful and fearsome light to always be allowed to shine. THE WHEELCHAIR FUND

Following a request from JSC [Jesuit Service Cambodia] the Trustees have approved the setting up of a separate fund to provide wheelchairs for the very poorest people with a disability, mainly landmine



victims. Lack of mobility affects both the whole family and the close community, especially in a rural village so although it is the individual who receives the chair, everyone benefits. **Wheelchairs, made in Cambodia, COST AROUND £100** [contributions can be any amount, from £1 upwards] and are allocated according to need with the poorest and most remotely located having priority.
